Summer Reads for Teens



The False Prince by *Jennifer A Nielsen* (1st book in Ascendance trilogy)

The thrilling first book in a brand-new trilogy filled with danger, deceit, and hidden identities. Sage, an orphaned thief, is one of four boys chosen to participate in a lethal contest. After being plucked from the streets by a nobleman named Connor, Sage learns that Connor plans to choose one of the orphans to impersonate a long-lost prince in the hopes of averting a civil war.

Going Over by *Beth Kephart*

In the early 1980s Ada and Stefan are young, would-be lovers living on opposite sides of the Berlin Wall-Ada lives with her mother and grandmother and paints graffiti on the Wall, and Stefan lives with his grandmother in the East and dreams of escaping to the West.

The Here and Now by *Ann Brashares*

Sixteen-year-old Prenna, an immigrant who moved to New York when she was twelve, came from another time and she and the other travelers must follow strict rules to avoid destroying the new life they have worked so hard to get, as well as the one person Prenna is desperate to protect.

Panic by *Lauren Oliver*

In the poor town of Carp, New York, a group of teens enters a high-stakes game that involves a series of secretive, possibly deadly challenges throughout the summer, with the winner receiving more than \$50,000-enough money to start a new life.

When the lower level became too crowded and the children's area was moved to the upper level it was difficult to assist those who used the upstairs. Many times parents were not able to take their children upstairs because of the lack of an elevator and the children were too small to navigate the stairway on their own. The seniors who had

gathered to play cards and socialize no longer had a room to use and the visiting nurses had to find a new location for the clinics they provided.
