Service Business of the Year is given to a business that demonstrates an economic enhancement to the area, provides sellable services and enhances the community image and enriches community life.


Retail Business of the Year is given to a business that demonstrates an economic enhancement to the area. providing products for purchase to the community, enhances the community image and enriches community life.

FROM THE LAKE - By Al Habeck

Hello residents of Hortonville and the Black Otter Lake District. For those that did not know, if you are a resident of the Village you are also a resident of the Lake District.

As the newly elected commissioner of the Black Otter Lake District, I want to pass along some information on the lake. This past summer we cut 25 loads of aquatic vegetation from the lake. I would like to thank Chris Schleif and Michael Mischker for volunteering to help with the cutting. The three of us spent about 45 hours on the lake this summer. It would have been nice if the DNR would have allowed more cutting than we did, but our permit only allowed us to cut lanes in the lake.

This coming year we are looking at doing a project called DASH that will remove the vegetation roots and all. We will only be able to do 2 acres at a time so we will be attacking invasive species first. This is projected to be better than spraying. For spraying to be effective it needs to be done at least 5 years, whereas removing the plant will get rid of most if not all of the plants in that 2 acres.

At our September 14th meeting we will be setting dates for our monthly meetings. To find out when the meetings are, check the Village web site. The Lake District also has a web site that we will be updating and posting agendas and minutes. We also have an e-mail mailing list. If you would like to be added to the list you can e-mail me at 51arh@charter.net and I will add you to the list.

What's going on at the old library site?

The former library site is the location for the new Memorial Square. The public space will have a water bottle filling/pet watering station, a decorative water wall, bike rack, sitting benches, planters, and greenery. The Village received a generous donation towards the space in memory of Jason Quinn. Development of the park space will progress as funds are available.



AED Located in the Village

Until now, all AEDs (Automatic External Defibrillator) in the Village were located in areas not accessible to the public or only during very limited hours. Thanks to a donation from Gold Cross Ambulance, there is an AED located in Hardtails Saloon, 208 W. Main Street. We plan to move it near the clock in central downtown for 24/7 access in the near future on a kiosk with a fire extinguisher, first aid kit, and security camera.
