

### **2018 BUDGET CHALLENGES**

The 2018 budget presented significant challenges. Tax levy cap combined with increased operational costs resulted in a baseline below 2017 levels for programs and projects that the Village is not required by law to provide such as brush pickup, park improvements, marketing, etc. In 2017, the Village enjoyed the highest net new construction in Outagamie County, at 3.67%. Net new construction for 2018 is 1.47%. Net new construction is used to determine levy cap, so the available increase in levy cap for the 2018 budget is considerably lower than it was in 2017. This means that the amount of the Village's portion of property taxes is allowed to increase from what was collected in 2017 by \$14,032. In comparison, in 2017 the allowable increase was just over \$34,000. Nearly the entire allowable increase in tax levy is consumed by the projected cost for the four 2018 elections (election machine programming, ballots, staffing). This leaves no funds to cover other increased costs such as employee insurance premium increases, increased printing


costs, and utilities. The Village had to make the difficult decision to suspend programs and projects for 2018 such as brush pickup, Otto Miller Athletic Field improvements, printed newsletters, and community promotion. The Village also chose to increase fees for the summer recreation program so that the program is self-funded and therefore not supplemented by tax levy.

**Levy:** The total levy increase of the 2018 budget results in a tax increase of 0.00234 cents (2 thousandths of a penny) per thousand dollars of value. This means an increase of \$3.51 for a home valued at \$150,000. Levy includes capital projects, debt service, and general fund.



**Capital projects** include road repair, planning projects, and village facilities projects above general maintenance. Capital projects accounts for \$17,979 in the 2018 budget. This is the lowest investment in capital projects since 2009. While there are grants available for capital projects, most have requirements that the village cannot meet such as job creation and low to moderate income residents. Because of levy caps and decreased transportation funding statewide, local governments look to other funding sources such as special assessment and tax increment financing (TIF).

**Debt service** includes municipal center construction, Black Otter Lake dam, road improvement, and vehicle and equipment loans. Debt service accounts for \$636,745 in the 2018 budget, which is an increase of 0.14% from 2017. Some of the debt (such as Industrial Park Road paving) will be paid by property owners within the industrial park through assessment.



**General fund** includes operating expenses such as payroll, utilities, fuel, street maintenance, elections, etc. The 2018 budget increases the general fund by 4.12% from 2017, or \$35,300. The 2018 budget includes a 2% increase in employee wages combined with decreased employee benefits (health insurance plan structure and higher employee contribution to deductible), and increases to elections, street maintenance, public notices, and employee insurance premiums.

### What is a "senior"?

# SPECIAL ASSESSMENT IN PARK R HEIGHTS SUBDIVISON FOR COMPLETION OF MICHAEL RITGER STREET

A special assessment is a charge assessed to real estate parcels for specific public improvements, usually roads, sidewalks, sewer, and water. The 2017 repaying of Industrial Park Road was paid for through special assessment charged to property owners within the industrial park rather than with the general tax levy, which is all taxpayers.

Park R Heights Subdivision was approved in 2001. The developer's agreement included an agreement that all property owners of the original plat would be equally responsible for future municipal improvements including construction of all street segments, curb and gutter, sidewalks, street lighting, storm sewer, sanitary sewer, and water mains as a special assessment. The agreement was recorded with the Outagamie County Register of Deeds and included a requirement that the developer and subsequent sellers are obligated to inform purchasers of the potential future assessment.

The Village of Hortonville plans to complete the segment of Michael Ritger Street connecting Gabriel Lane to Emily Way in 2018. The cost of the project will be special assessed in accordance with the agreement. The properties to be assessed are all those in the Park R Heights subdivision including Gabriel Lane, Herbert Drive, Howard Drive, Florence Court, Emily Way, and the 800 blocks of Michael Ritger Street and Hickory Street.

The Village will hold a hearing regarding the special assessment in early 2018.

### **COTTAGES ON MAIN**

Plans are moving forward for 20 cottages (single level) and 20 townhomes (2-level) on Main Street next to Charlie's Drive In. The development will include 4 buildings, each with 10 units. One building will also house the clubhouse and fitness center. The units will be a mix of 2 and 3 bedrooms. Each unit will have a private entrance.
